We FEED, TEACH and GROW to create a healthy and hunger-free North Carolina.

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
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IMPACT REPORT

COVID-19 RESPONSE

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, Inter-Faith Food Shuttle staff has remained hyper-focused on providing innovative, transformative solutions to meet immediate needs and end hunger in our community.



42,204 frozen meals

These nutrient-rich individual quick-frozen meals were prepared and distributed by the Food Shuttle culinary team, temporary workers, and area restaurants.



10,925 weekend supplement bags

To ensure weekend meals for students, weekend supplement bags of healthy food items and snacks were distributed to children.



19,095 emergency food boxes

Filled with healthy non-perishable food items, these **emergency food boxes** helped stock the pantry for families in need.



200% Mobile Markets increase

The **Mobile Markets** served unprecedented numbers of families

and individuals, with new locations added to supplement the regular schedule. The number of households served by **Mobile Markets** increased nearly **200**%.



25,758 frozen family meals

In partnership with area restaurants, these nutritious frozen family meals were distributed individually and alongside shelf-stable food items and fresh produce.

1,697,327 POUNDS OF FOOD

In total, through Food Shuttle programs, 1,697,327 **pounds of food** were distributed.

Margie Blake and her granddaughters

Margie Blake doesn't get out much anymore. It's just too hard to keep up with her three young great, great, great granddaughters who have moved in with her since their mother was unable to care for them for a time. Margie, a retired teaching assistant in Smithfield, used to go to the Johnston County Mobile Market once a month to supplement her small food budget. Now, each week. Food Shuttle volunteers Sheila and Gerald pick up food donations from the Sheetz in Smithfield--one of the Food Shuttle's community partners—and bring Margie and her granddaughters a supply of groceries to ensure that they get the nutrition they need to get through the week. "They're a godsend," says Margie. She couldn't be more grateful for the food donations that feed her small family: "God put it in their mind to do this for a reason." A very good reason, indeed.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Mac Newsom retired back in 2009 and started looking for some volunteer work to fill his time. He had heard about Jill Staton Bullard and her epiphany at McDonald's and thought it was a great idea, that the Food Shuttle would be a good fit for him. "I'm not very happy when I see hungry people, especially children." Mac began sharing his time with the Food Shuttle as a driver on a box truck, helping with pickups at local grocery stores. He quickly moved to delivering BackPack Buddies in Chatham County. Mac has never forgotten the feelings he experienced pushing a cart with 40 or 50 bags down a school hallway. "Nobody can learn if they are hungry, especially kids in school. I'm really encouraged by the Food Shuttle's unique approaches to help solve hunger. The Food Shuttle is a very special organization that really is determined to feed, teach and grow."

PARTNER AGENCY SPOTLIGHT



Lottie Moore of The Oaks Community

Lottie Moore is well known among the residents of The Oaks community in North Raleigh, as well she should be. Lottie has been Resident Council President of the Raleigh Housing Authority Community since 1992 and has spent the better part of the last three decades doing all she can to improve the lives of the 170 or so people who live there. A big part of that effort has been strengthening the relationship between The Oaks and Inter-Faith Food Shuttle. Whether it's a Mobile Market. afterschool snacks, annual back-to-school supplies, nutrition classes for families living on a tight budget, or turkeys and all the trimmings at Thanksgiving—the connection between The Oaks and the Food Shuttle runs deep and makes a world of difference for the families of the community it serves. "Inter-Faith Food Shuttle has been a lifesaver. They have been a support system. They ask the questions that need to be asked," says Lottie. "The Food Shuttle is always there to help."

Sucheta Jain of Farragut Systems


For over 20 years, Farragut Systems' employees take time out of their week, and funds from their own pockets to sponsor and pack bags of nutritious food for the Food Shuttle's BackPack Buddies program. This past year, they sponsored and packed 100 bags per weeks for children at Parkwood and Eastgate Elementary Schools in Durham. Farragut Systems' Co-Founder and Co-Owner Sucheta Jain understands the critical connection food has to children's ability to learn. "Education is the key to everything," she says. Even with changes due to the pandemic, Farragut Systems continues to fund the Food Shuttle's child hunger program. "When you actually fill the bags, you recognize the reality that someone is going to eat this food. It's not just the impact of the food. It's the impact on us, as well. It's not wrong to say that 'It takes a village.' It really does."


2019-2020 REVENUE
